





This book contains brief interviews with children from some of the French-speaking areas/countries around the world: Belgium, Algeria, Gabon, Quebec, Martinique, New Caledonia. If possible, locate these areas on a map of the world. Stress the value of being able to speak French, not only in France, which may



surprise pupils. You could do some cross-curricular work studying the historical reasons for this, as many countries where French is spoken today were French colonies in past years.

Background on

Gabon: This African country was once a French colony, part of French Equatorial Africa. Although other languages are spoken too, the official language is French.

New Caledonia: This South Pacific island still uses French as its official language.

Belgium: Tintin's adventures were written by Belgian author Hergé and are available in translation in countries worldwide. In Belgium, French is one of three official languages. It is spoken predominantly in the southern part of the country.

Algeria: The North African country of Algeria was under French rule from 1830 to 1962 and many Algerians still speak French today.

Quebec: Canada is a bilingual country (English/Arench). Quebec, the largest and second most-populated province, is unque in the country as it is predominantly French-speaking.

Martinique: This Caribbean island became a French plony back in 1635 and today remains an Overseas department of the Republic of
